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he North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching experienced significant developments during the 2018-2019 school year, adding dynamic faculty members, expanding professional development opportunities, and increasing the number of teachers served through online, offsite, and residential professional development. Our new faculty members (former N.C. Teacher of the Year Darcy Grimes and Dr. Bonnie Bolado) have broadened our areas of expertise as NCCAT continues to reinforce the best teaching practices and provide teachers the necessary reflection to improve their performance to increase student achievement.

Kelley Hensley, a teacher at Montgomery County's West End East Middle School, described what NCCAT does for teachers: "NCCAT offers an invaluable service to teachers within the state. You have the best reputation for professional development among my peers that I have ever seen, no matter the program subject matter. You build solid and well-thought-out programming. NCCAT is also one of the rare opportunities for professionals to expand their views past the norms in their own counties as they search for new perspective to common problems. NCCAT strives to impact student learning through engaging teacher professional development. This year our focus reflected the needs and priorities of the state—early grades literacy, K-12 literacy, digital learning, beginning teacher support, STEM initiatives, and math.

All programming regardless of specific content focuses on transfer of learning to classroom practice to maximize the impact when teachers return to their schools and classrooms. At NCCAT we are dedicated to ensuring that every week, every day and every moment, we are true to the mission with which we are charged—retaining and growing North Carolina teachers to promote student learning.

Highlights over the past year included continued development of teacher leadership institutes weeks designed to support district initiatives based on identified needs and leadership potential that fundamentally change teacher practices and ensure leadership growth and talent develop-

In addition to programs for beginning teachers that focus on their general and specific needs, we have been developing a new Beginning Teacher of the Year (BTOY) program and event to be held Dec 2-6, 2019, in Cullowhee. This beginning teacher leadership week is designed to spotlight excellence in our newest educators and promote the retention of our best and brightest new teaching talent. It will culminate with the announcement of the first "North Carolina Beginning Teacher of the Year" in an inaugural presentation of what will become an annual event.

Whether residential, school-based, or online, NCCAT programs consistently and constantly promote and produce talent development, best practices, and growth among individual teachers and the profession to the benefit of North Carolina's students and its schools. We thank you for your support!

PROGRAMMING: YEAR IN REVIEW

NCCAT program topics are based on responses from participant surveys, licensure and standards updates, curriculum leader surveys, and state and national trends. As a result of feedback, we expanded our STEM and math offerings, and continued to grow our digital learning, literacy, teacher leadership, and beginning teacher support. Our constant goal, whether through residential, regional, school-based, or online professional learning, is to provide teachers with knowledge, tools, and skills to improve classroom instruction. This professional growth ultimately makes a remarkable difference in student learning. In NCCAT's quest for systemic impact in supporting North Carolina student learning, we were able to serve teachers in 114 of 115 North Carolina school districts this year.

beginning teacher support

NCCAT provides teachers in their first three years of teaching with support in instructional delivery, content mastery, classroom management, relationship and culture building, and much more.

NCCAT also offers specialized support for new exceptional childrens' teachers and lateral entry teachers.

teacher leadership institute

Teacher leadership at NCCAT focuses on district identified areas of need. Our Teacher Leadership Institutes help grow teachers into leaders who feel empowered to lead in their classrooms, schools, and districts.

digital learning

Digital learning at NCCAT includes a wide array of options, from residential, week-long professional learning to one day, school-based, or online courses. NCCAT digital learning provides personalized instruction in digital learning competencies.

math

NCCAT's math professional development spans from residential programming such as "Creating and Sustaining Mathematical Understanding" to school-based programs with subsequent coaching on building conceptual understanding. Regional learning opportunities in vertical alignment of math curriculum are also available.

literacy

NCCAT literacy professional learning focuses on both early grades literacy and content area literacy development. Teachers can attend programs on motivating readers, utilizing literacy data to inform instruction, and strategies for subject area comprehension. NCCAT provides a variety of literacy opportunities, including the NCCAT Literacy Badge, our five-day badge series on reading fundamentals.

stem

Our new Makerlab provides teachers the opportunity to expand their hands-on learning on a variety of STEM related topics. Whether learning about coding, design thinking, or developing a MakerSpace, teachers have access to cutting edge STEM instruction. Our STEM professional development programs are designed to equip teachers with the skills they need to integrate science, technology, engineering, art, and math into their school curriculum, aligning with state, national, international, and industry standards.

She has attended and presented at NCCAT for several years, most recently leading the programs "Teaching Generation Z: Active and Digital Learning" and "Integrating Coding Skills into your Classroom."

BEGINNING TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

The NCCAT Beginning Teacher of the Year Award will be given for the first time in December 2019. NCCAT, a long-time supporter of teaching excellence, is partnering with North Carolina school districts and charter schools to identify and recognize the best of this beginning teacher corps.

EXPANDED LITERACY BADGE

NCCAT will hold a five session series to enable teachers to earn an NCCAT Literacy Badge.
