Thank you. In many ways, these simple but sincere words of our deep gratitude are the best way of expressing our feelings to the educators and partners who helped us make 2021-22 another great year at NCCAT supporting teachers and impacting students throughout North Carolina.

Once again, NCCAT served every school district in North Carolina, increasing the number of participants served through residential, school-based, and online professional development.

NCCAT continues to prioritize early grades literacy with professional development focused on the science of reading and with our first annual Literacy Leaders Conference. The Curriculum Leaders Conference gave leaders from across the state a chance to learn and share while letting NCCAT know what school districts need for ongoing professional development. Professional learning programming in other areas such as math, science, and more were available year-round.

Teachers routinely tell us in surveys the time with us has changed their practice and helped them work to improve student outcomes. Teachers like Margaret Maurice, a former NCCAT participant and Hidden Valley Elementary teacher in Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools says attending a program at NCCAT has been valuable in her classroom.

NCCAT's First Annual Literacy Leaders Conference

More than 90 educators from across North Carolina attended the first North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) Literacy Leaders Conference in Cullowhee Nov. 8-11.

The four-day conference featured national presenters, breakout sessions and collaboration time to assist Literacy Leaders in their district to advance literacy for NC students.

The conference provided opportunity for networking and learning to aid North Carolina's current and future needs in early grades literacy.

NCCAT Learning Leaders

The NCCAT Learning Leaders initiative is designed to create content-specific professional development leaders who provide North Carolina educators the best practices to improve instruction.

NCCAT Learning Leaders are selected through a rigorous application process to lead our NCCAT Badging professional development across the state. Learning Leaders are provided with the tools, knowledge, and experience to share their expertise in school districts and schools in their respective geographic region.

These Learning Leaders become well-versed in the "NCCAT Way," a methodology designed to encourage change in teacher practice and ultimately produce student learning growth. The first cohorts focused on the NCCAT Literacy Badge and NCCAT Math Badge.



NCCAT Cullowhee Campus Renovation and Expansion

NCCAT is thankful for the support of the additional \$23,416,952 capital funding received in the 2020-2022 biennial budget for renovation and expansion of the NCCAT Cullowhee Campus.

With this funding, NCCAT will increase the number of programs offered and teachers served each year on the Cullowhee Campus. Construction is scheduled to begin in fall 2023.

MATH BADGE

The NCCAT Math Badge journey focuses on helping educators bring the best practices for math instruction to life in their classrooms.

Participants who choose to earn their NCCAT Math Badge will apply their new learning in a range of settings including classroom instruction and coaching. They will also complete written assignments reflecting on the impact of their new learning and planned next steps.

Teachers may also choose to attend individual sessions to strengthen their math instructional practices based on each session focus.



Emily Myers serves as the Senior Mathematics Specialist for the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching,

where she facilitates professional learning for educators throughout North Carolina. Her focus area includes 6-12 mathematics instruction. Emily joined NCCAT following her role as Secondary Curriculum Director in Beaufort County Schools. Previously, she served as the Mathematics Instructional Specialist for Beaufort County Schools and Math Teacher for New Hanover County Schools. Emily is working on her Ed.D. at UNCW and holds a B.S. in Mathematics from Meredith College, M.A. in Mathematics from Wake Forest University, and National Board Certification.








SCHOOL-BASED



What Does Scholarship Funds Provide?

- Instruction and Program Materials
- Substitute Teacher Reimbursement
- Teacher Travel—excluding hotel stay expenses when traveling to and from campus
- Lodging and meals while on the NCCAT campus
- \$250 for use in the classroom
- Each fully endowed scholarship is awarded annually to a full-time NC teacher, based on criteria determined by the scholarship benefactor



HONORED EDUCATOR SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Honored Educator Scholarship Program of the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching provides an opportunity to recognize life's great teachers by establishing scholarships in their names. NCCAT invites you to establish a scholarship in honor of someone whose teaching has made a positive difference in your life. He or she may be a classroom teacher, coach, administrator, school board member, or community volunteer; someone whose influence has led to knowledge, skills, and values that helped you prepare for life's challenges.

Scholarships can be established with preference for teachers from a geographic area or an academic discipline. Scholarships are administered by NCCAT and will be awarded when they reach the endowment goal of \$25,000. Each named scholarship will be awarded annually to a North Carolina teacher. Teachers will be invited to apply for a residential NCCAT seminar of their choice. Scholarships will cover the costs of the seminar, travel, and substitute teacher. A \$250 cash award for classroom use is included as well.


