

NCCAT Beginning Teacher of the Year Event Honors Teaching Profession

Natalia Mejia (right), a teacher at CC Griffin STEM Middle School in Cabarrus County Schools, was named the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) 2023 Empower NC Beginning Teacher of the Year in a special ceremony at the John W. Bardo Fine and Performing Arts Center on the campus of Western Carolina University Thursday March 9th.

The award was presented for the fourth time with finalists from across the state in attendance. Mejia prioritizes relationships, and she notes: "students will not understand why their teachers are trying to hold them accountable if they do not realize that you have their best interests at heart." She experienced 100 percent growth of her students in her first year of teaching.

The runner-up is Ms. Kirby Forbes (left), a Teacher at Lee County High School in Lee County Schools. Forbes is described as engaging and motivating. An administrator noted that she breaks down the material to the smallest detail and then helps students build it back up to gain a complete understanding.

Inaugural NCCAT CTE Teacher of the Year Event Successful

Missy Swain (right), from Currituck County Schools, was named the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) 2022 Career & Technical Education (CTE) Teacher of the Year in a special ceremony at the John W. Bardo Fine and Performing Arts Center on the campus of Western Carolina University Thursday, October 6, 2022.

The award was presented for the first time with finalists from across the state in attendance. Swain is described as a teacher who makes sure her classroom is a place where students have success. A parent stated that Swain is an amazing person and teacher who has shared her gifts and talents with children. The parent added, "They are better people for having known her and for having learned from her. I am extremely grateful to her for what she has done and continues to do not only for my children but our community."

The runner-up is Robert Ballard (left) a teacher with Chapel Hill-Carrboro City Schools. A few comments shared about Mr. Ballard: "I have not been around a more passionate and caring person when it comes to their students succeeding." Another person said: "He ignites enthusiasm for learning, collaborates with community stakeholders, and prepares his students to be job ready in the automotive industry." Through partnerships, Ballard organized a racing program connecting Chapel Hill High School and NASCAR. Senior students have worked towards receiving an official NASCAR pit crew license.

CURRICULUM LEADERS CONFERENCE

Educators from around North Carolina joined the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) for the NCCAT Conference for Curriculum Leaders on Sept. 14-16 at the Cullowhee campus. More than 100 participants were part of the three-day conference that allowed state curriculum leaders to collaborate and share ideas for this upcoming school year. The agenda for the NCCAT conference was based on feedback from curriculum leaders. Conference attendees were able to identify needs in their districts and give feedback on future NCCAT programming decisions.

Topics included: Curriculum & Instruction updates, Leading a Coaching Culture, Reigniting Teacher and Student Engagement with Blended Learning, and more. The conference began in 2016 to seek input and support North Carolina curriculum leaders' work in their district. The conference also helps NCCAT build relationships with leaders in school districts across the state.

















LITERACY LEADERS CONFERENCE

More than 80 educators from across North Carolina attended the second North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching (NCCAT) Literacy Leaders Conference in Cullowhee from November 30 to December 2, 2022.

The three-day conference featured general session presenters, breakout sessions and collaboration to help literacy leaders take steps to support literacy instruction in North Carolina. 

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HONORED EDUCATOR

SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

The Honored Educator Scholarship Program of the North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching provides an opportunity to recognize life's great teachers by establishing scholarships in their names. NCCAT invites you to establish a scholarship in honor of someone whose teaching has made a positive difference in your life. He or she may be a classroom teacher, coach, administrator, school board member, or community volunteer- someone whose influence has led to knowledge, skills, and values that helped you prepare for life's challenges.

Scholarships can be established with preference for teachers from a geographic area or an academic discipline. Scholarships are administered by NCCAT and are awarded when they reach the endowment goal of \$25,000. Each named scholarship will be awarded annually to a North Carolina teacher. Teachers will be invited to apply for a residential NCCAT seminar of their choice. Scholarships will cover the costs of the seminar, travel, and substitute teacher. A \$250 cash award for classroom use is included as well.

Continued professional development support in areas such as literacy, mathematics, science, social studies, CTE and more will positively impact students and families across the state.














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
